GOLDEN WEDDING.

Our highly esteemed ex-Chief Justice—the Hon. H. Darrell, C.M.G.—and his amiable wife, celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding on the 25th inst., at "Cavendish," the residence of His Honor.

During the afternoon nearly 200 visitors offered their congratulations and partook of cake and wine. A very great number of very elegant and valuable presents from friends in England and America, as well as Bermuda, adorned several tables in the drawing room.

From 3 o'clock until dark visitors were constantly arriving and departing.

In the dining room the table was adorned with a magnificent Plato presented by the Colony to His Honor on his retiring from office. It was richly decorated with choice flowers. It bore several splendid cakes—one a present from the grandchildren abroad, another a thoughtful offering to the hosts, and the third, and tallest, bore the arms of the Darrell family, and a motto of a "Golden Wedding," on banners painted with exquisite taste and presented for the occasion, while between the banners waved from a slender stem a mirror of glass, which adorned Mrs. Darrell's wedding cake just fifty years before. There were seven children and ten grandchildren present; some of whom had come home from abroad for the occasion.

ARRIVAL OF THE ENGLISH MAIL OF THE 8TH INSTANT.

The Royal Mail Steamer *Beta*, Capt. Shaw, from Halifax, with the English Mail of the 8th February, arrived at St. George late on Thursday evening last. The Mails for the Western districts reached Hamilton Post Office about 12 o'clock. This mail was brought out direct by the *Hibernian*, not calling, as during the Summer months, at St. Johns, Newfoundland. She arrived at Halifax on the 20th Inst.

The Mail Steamer *Canina* due yesterday from New York, had not made her appearance up to sundown last evening. We presume the stormy weather of the past week has caused her detention.
